COURSE DESCRIPTION: Covers the writing of resumes and letters of application, interviewing techniques, and career planning strategies. Resumes and letters of application will be constructed and interviewing techniques and career goals will be discussed as they relate to the student's career field.

OBJECTIVES: Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Construct a professional looking resume.
- 2. Write a professional looking cover letter.
- 3. Correctly and professionally prepare material associated with the job search.
- 4. Professionally prepare for and participate in an interview.
- 5. Prepare a professional portfolio presentation summarizing his/her specific qualifications.
- 6. Communicate effectively his/her assets, capabilities, skills, and values.

This instruction will be delivered by the librarian, in conjunction with the regular instructor. The librarian is responsible for preparation of the instructional materials, which will be reviewed by the regular instructor.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS: Combination of lecture, class discussion and assignments will be utilized. This is a student-based course and much of the work expected of the student is experiential.
